Review of the Year 19/20

Having been a Governor at F&B for around 15 years now, it can safely be said that this has been the strangest and most difficult year I can remember for staff, parents, pupils and governors. I would like to take this opportunity once again to thank Mrs Brooker and all of the staff for everything they have done over the past months; firstly to step and run the school in the absence of Ms Euesden, and then to face the challenge of educating the children during the pandemic.

I am aware of how difficult it has been for many families to have to educate children at home whilst also working, and I would also like to thank parents (and children) for their support with learning. Instead, we've embraced Microsoft Teams and it's enabled us to meet more frequently with Mrs Brooker to discuss Government guidance as and when it has been issued (and often changed at short notice). One benefit of Teams has been that parent governors in particular have found attending easier (reduced childcare issues) and even Governors needing to shield have been able to participate. The downside? We appear to have a Governor who is upside down on the screen in most meetings, so if anyone knows the fix to that please let us know!

We hope that the ability to meet in person will be something that is in place by the time we look interview for the permanent headship. We're very pleased with how the new interim leadership team is working, and would like to take time to work with them to review options for the future. As you will now know, Mrs Wilcox (picture below) has agreed to join us as Interim Co-Head to ensure that Mrs Brooker can have some much-needed family time. The Governing Body is keen to ensure that we support the wellbeing of the staff as well as the pupils and this arrangement helps support that aim.

Hopefully by the time next year's newsletter comes along things at F&B will be back to normal but in the meantime we can be reassured that the staff at F&B will be here to support the children and parents.
